Notes from the Coordinator

The bookwork is now in progress between QR and Rockhampton Regional Council on the steam engine coming to Rockhampton. The volunteers are looking forward to having C17 988 at Archer Park and another exhibit for the museum.

The air conditioner in the refreshment room has still not been repaired after breaking down the week before Christmas. The parts arrived in Rockhampton early February but because the building is Heritage Listed there remains the problem of getting to the unit in the ceiling, whether to cut a man hole in the ceiling or take sheets of iron off the roof. We certainly can't hold any functions in the refreshment room until the system is repaired. Visitor numbers at the museum are at their lowest in years due to the Rocky floods, and Cyclone Yasi has also deterred visitors from venturing north of Brisbane. With two or three more cyclone to come yet I can't see visitor number improving until April.

It was very sad to learn of Bill Miller's passing a few months ago in Sydney, Bill had been a volunteer at Archer Park since 2000 but has been visiting Archer Park since 1994 and become good friends of my late wife and myself.

Bill came up to Rocky nearly every year and early on stayed with my late wife and myself, then in later years stayed with Dot Marshall. Bill lived for trains and travelled around Australia taking thousands of photos of every class of locomotive he could find and railway installations.

Bill loved Archer Park and said he always felt at home here. You always new when Bill was here because of his laugh, you could hear it all over the museum. I don't know if there are any trains in heaven but I know one thing for certain Bill will make one if there isn't. Rest in Peace, Bill, you will always be remembered.

It was also sad to learn of Des Neil's Mother passing away and Dot Marshall also lost her sister Iris in Young NSW. Our condolences to both Des and Dot on this sad occasion.

DEL 1614 is still not movable, with a valve still not functioning right. The loco will start and run but try to move it and it doesn't want to respond. A seal in one of the valves is faulty and we are trying to get one from Ipswich.

At long last we are getting the gap between the roof and the top of the rooms 'bird proofed'. It's taken two years to get this done with pigeons making there home in this area and nearly every morning pigeon poo has to be cleaned off seats, window sills, platform and tables. Wire netting is going to be in place the length of the station so the pigeons can't land and start nesting.

The Purrey Steam Tram is having a new smoke stack built. The inspection before Christmas found that one side of the chimney had rusted out. The local engineering firm that does our boiler inspections has undertaken to do the job.

New refractory cement has been put around some of the fire bricks in the Purrey fire box.

All fire bars had to be removed, that was the easy part, but when the boys tried to put them back they had a time trying to get them to fit. After nearly half a day they finally got all the bars back in place.

Another problem we have is trying to replace the metal wire cable connecting the ash pan damper door to the handle in the cabin. This stainless steel cable is 3mm thick and it's been difficult finding a Rocky business to supply this type of cable.

As the President of the Friends, Merv Edmonston, will not be standing for the Presidency this year I would like to take this opportunity to thank him for all his hard work, dedication and forward thinking over the past twelve months. I know everyone will join with me in wishing Merv all the best in the future, and thank him for a job well done.

Flood Recovery


The Australian Sugar Cane Railway, Bundaberg was one of the rail heritage sites hit hardest by the recent floods. Fortunately hard work by their volunteers has been able to return much of the system to operation.

The flood caused major damage to the main running line outside the compound and to the triangle, and minor damage to the rest of the main line. ASCR's track maintenance team, working under Cane Railway Engineers Ron Stitt and Ron Atkinson, has worked miracles in a short period of time with the help of a contractor using a rubber tracked digger. All main line damage has been repaired and other repairs are ongoing.
